## NORDIC SPIRIT 2019: *How We Got Here*

How did your family get to Canada? What dangers and adventures did you encounter along the way? From the time of Leif Erikson until recently, travel from Nordic countries to Canada has been arduous and required people of imagination and resourcefulness, stamina, and courage. Somehow we all managed to get here. The Scandinavian Cultural Society wants to find out how you travelled for our *Nordic Spirit 2019: How We Got Here* - April 13th and 14th at the Scandinavian Community Centre.

The SCS again invites members of our local community to contribute their photos, recollections and family stories of immigrant travel for this spring's heritage photo show. Did you come from Norway with your family in a small fishing boat escaping from the German army like some members of our Norwegian community? One 14-year-old Swedish girl made her way alone from Ellis Island in New York to Silver Hill, BC when her family left her behind until she could pass the immigrant health examination. These are fascinating stories. You may have similar tales in your family's experience.

The 2019 *Nordic Spirit* show continues the Cultural Society's program of heritage collection and preservation. The past eleven shows displayed primarily unpublished photos and stories from our members' private collections together with text documenting our immigrant or later experience. Our new show continues this collection. We are focussing on the period up to 1960, but some later information may also be useful.

As usual, we hope to work with our various Centre communities and other experts to gather and arrange photos and stories. Rolf Buschardt Christensen, President of the Federation of Danish Associations in Canada has already offered support in terms of material and photos he has gathered about early immigrant ships. Please offer your help too, both with donations of your heritage photos and information but also with your support on our organizing committees. We need help to collect material from each of our member countries. We also need technicians (paid) to scan and improve older photos and to help us set them into pages together with text for printing and framing. We also want people to prepare and present short talks of their experiences in travelling to Canada. Helping put together this show is rewarding work; you are helping to preserve our history as well as making a fine event for our Centre community.

## DANISH LANGUAGE CLASSES

**We are now taking registration for the Spring 2019 Session.**

**ATTENTION! STUDENTS AND SCHOLARS**

Ten \$1,200 scholarships will be awarded by the Danish House Society and the Danish-Canadian Community Centre of B. C. as well as two \$2,400 scholarships that have been designated in appreciation of funds willed to the Danish House Society by the Estate of Ruth and Johannes Pedersen. A total of twelve scholarships will be awarded to the top 12 students. To apply and subsequently qualify you must meet the following criteria:

- a) Be of Danish heritage *and* a member or connected through family to a member (*name please for verification*) of the Danish House Society or the Danish-Canadian Community Centre of B.C. If you are *not* of Danish heritage you may still qualify if you are a member or connected through family to a member of the Danish House Society or the Danish-Canadian Community Centre of B.C. **Please note: The membership must have taken effect at least one year prior to your application date.**
- b) Be a resident of British Columbia working towards a degree or diploma in an accredited post-secondary institution such as a college or university or at an institution certified by Employment and Social Development Canada (ESDC) to get or improve skills in an occupation. Evidence of registration in such an institution is required along with a **transcript of latest marks and studies.**
- c) Be of good character and provide written references from a high school or college administrator, and at least **two current references** including an employer, if applicable.

Application *must* be made by a **hand-written letter** giving your reasons for requesting the scholarship and describing your personal interests, hobbies, goals, dreams, financial need, and volunteer experience. Participation as a volunteer in Danish House Society activities should be noted. All of the Scholarships will be awarded in September 2019.

## DANISH ISLAND POINTS THE WAY TO GREEN-POWER POTENTIAL

### The Danish Island of Samsø doesn't have even a single traffic light to match the one on Haida Gwaii (Queen Charlotte Islands).

With just 3,700 people, Samsø leads the world for its switch to green energy, and it has made good money doing so. “It was a bit of a job, because it was a conservative little community that didn't really like change so much,” says Søren Hermansen, an islander who got hired 20 years ago to start organizing Samsø's shift away from imported diesel and coal power.

“It's probably much easier here, where you're really much more ready for change.”

Hermansen and Thomas Winkler, the Danish ambassador to Canada, recently spoke at the Kay Centre in Skidegate as part of an inter-island exchange with Haida Gwaii.

A few months ago, Gwaliga Hart and Jaalen Edenshaw flew to Samsø on behalf of the Haida Nation, to see how people there managed to finance and build enough renewable energy projects to make the island energy independent and carbon-neutral.

Since about 2008, Samsingers have produced more wind, biomass, and solar energy each year than they use from fossil fuels.

Winkler explained that overall, Denmark is a rich country – the average income is about \$74,000. But unlike Canada, Denmark is not particularly rich in natural resources.

“We have a little oil and gas in the North Sea – nothing that will keep us going for very long,” Winkler said.

“So we've always been dependent on importing energy, until our government decided we must find another way of making our community not just work, but also grow.”

In 1998, following the Kyoto Protocol, Samsø competed with four other areas of Denmark to be chosen as the country's renewable-energy role model. The target, which they hit, was to be carbon-neutral in 10 years.

But apart from funding his job, Hermansen said the win didn't come with any special breaks or direct funding. The islanders had to come up with their own plan, and they had to invest their own money.

Like any part of Denmark, Samsø could access some generous government subsidies and 10-year power-price guarantees for renewable power projects. But the islanders had to match those with private investment and local co-operatives, and a lot relied on bank loans.

Hermansen said Samsø isn't particularly rich either. “We are the poorest island in Denmark.”

In fact, the island's farming and fishing economy has struggled for decades, and still does. Summer tourism has become the second-biggest business on island – the favourite spot is a protected coastal area.

Like Haida Gwaii, Samsø is not an easy place for young people to find work and the population is declining. Hermansen, who grew up on a family farm, had to go off-island to finish high school, and there have also been cuts to the local hospital service.

So to get community buy-in, Hermansen said people had to trust there was a solid business case behind the green-energy shift.

“It's not a vision or a dream, it's something really concrete,” he said, noting that it was important to move bit-by-bit, and to meet in person with small groups of people.

Hermansen said the islanders decided not to invest in any technology that was unlikely to pay for itself in 10 years.

Back in 1998, that meant going with wind turbines and district heating systems powered by locally grown hay – something local farmers liked.

Eventually, the islanders built 10 onshore and 11 offshore wind turbines, plus four biomass heating plants and some solar panels, including some that now charge a fleet of electric cars.

Unlike Haida Gwaii, Samsø is connected to the mainland power grid, and about 80,000 of the 105,000 megawatt-hours the island produces gets sold to the rest of Denmark.

Hermansen said it was that opportunity to make money, not just the environmental goal, that motivated people enough to build 70-metre wind turbines along Samsø's scenic skyline.

“When they're spinning, it sounds very good,” he said. “It sounds like money in your pocket, because all the money stays on the island”.

Hermansen said in the 1990s, Samsø's choice of wind power made sense given the island's windy location, and the costs at the time.

Haida Gwaii might decide on different technology, he said, but the much bigger challenge is simply to get everyone to agree on the plan.

## DANISH CANADIAN CONFERENCE & HERITAGE SEMINAR

Here we are in 2019, four hundred years after Jens Munk left Copenhagen, sailing west, to try to find the Northwest Passage, north of Canada to China. The anniversary of this expedition will be commemorated at the Danish Canadian Conference in Winnipeg. The Danish Federation's Jens Munk Commemorative Steering Committee, chaired by Carl Sorensen of Edmonton, is working on a host of exciting activities to bring awareness of this voyage of discovery.

The Danish Canadian Conference will be held at the Hotel Fort Garry in Winnipeg from Thursday, May 23 to Sunday, May 26, 2019. The Conference Theme is "The Arctic: Past, Present and Future" with focus on Jens Munk's expedition.

The Danish Club in Winnipeg is planning a grand conference which will also include a flag-raising ceremony at City Hall, as Dannebrog turns 800-years in June. Moreover, the Danish Ambassador to Canada, H. E. Thomas Winkler, will be joining us for our Conference.

The Seminar is in English.
