Dear Members,

This year has been an exciting year for those of us in the greater Vancouver Norwegian community.

2025 marked 200 years of the first organized emigration of Norwegians to North America which was recognized with the Crossings 200 initiative and Norway House Society joined with the Icelandic House Society and the Scandinavian Cultural Society on Leif Erikson Day to celebrate the milestone. One of the highlights of the event was to hear the immigration stories of some of our members and their families. These stories which were shared have been recorded for posterity. I find the immigration stories fascinating as they are so varied – each journey is unique! If you do not know the details of your family members' immigration story, I encourage you to ask and write or record them to allow future generations to know of their family's journey.

Norway was also highlighted in the broader Vancouver community with the arrival of the 111 year old Norwegian Tall Ship, the Statsraad Lehmkuhl. It was a wonderful opportunity for the public, members of the Norwegian community and students from Crosstown Elementary School to be able to have a tour of the ship. Captain Marcus, the ship's crew and the members of the scientific team were gracious hosts. The school children received a talk from

the scientific team member on the ship giving them insights into the research the team is doing on the ship.

Senior staff members from the Norwegian Embassy in Canada were welcomed at the Scandinavian Centre while the Statsraad Lehmkuhl was in port. It was a pleasure to showcase the Centre, its activities and Norway House Society.

I wish to thank each of you who volunteer with Norway House Society -- it is the time you so willingly give and your effort which makes Norway House Society the success that it is.

I look forward to meeting all members at one of the many upcoming events.

Congratulations to the five people who won a pair of passes to the Cineplex Cinema screening of Sentimental Value:

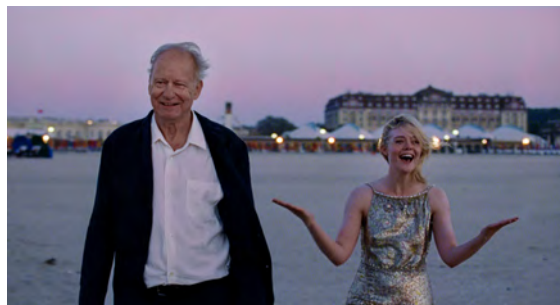

Aaslaug Boulrier

The difference dedicated volunteers make

None of us knew that many of the relationships formed in 1995, when NHS was established to complete the Norwegian community's purchase of our portion of what has become the Scandinavian Community Centre, would last us the rest of our lives. And just how many friendships we would make.

And we didn't know how dedicated and invaluable many of our volunteers would be - for these 30 years - raising money, raising awareness, promoting culture and history and raising community.

One of those volunteers is Aaslaug Boulrier - one of the earliest donors and volunteers to join the project. Just 50 at the time, she has been unwavering in her commitment to creating a true Nordic community centre. While some of us have stepped away at times, she never has.

And with her artistic skills, design knowledge and understanding of how to connect people with their heritage, Aaslaug's impact has often been subtle - or not. And she has left a physical mark - often with paint - not just on walls.

To help make the Norway Room unique, she picked the colour scheme and added traditional Rosemalt detailing to the ceiling beams. And later to signage and displays around the Centre upon request.

Besides helping with fundraising, event planning, cleaning, decorating and painting everywhere in the Centre, Aaslaug has, over the years, been part of several SCCS Decorating Committees.

Significantly she has spent 17 years on the NHS Board of Directors - always there to remind others that the purpose of creating the Centre was to maintain a home for our community in Canada.

Aaslaug has been active in ensuring Midsummer displays meet the annual theme, adding photo-opp elements to the tent entrances, knowing what and where artifacts are, and making certain Norwegian history, arts and crafts are alive and accurate in displays. Norwegian display cabinet exhibits have often been in her hands - so it gets done.

To ensure authenticity and variety, as a Midsummer and craft fair vendor Aaslaug creates and sells artwork, Rosemalt items, amazing knitted items - always following trends in Norway and sharing them. In addition, she represents Norway in cultural events, including demonstrating and teaching Rosemaling.

For decades, Aaslaug, together with Kari Bratsberg has worked tirelessly to create, catalogue and maintain the Norwegian language library in the Norway Room, including asking people to pick up some of the latest books while in Norway to avoid the shipping costs. An active member of an all-nation Centre book clubs, she even follows the literary trends in all the Nordic nations.

Aaslaug looks after the details, not just the big projects, including helping ensure we always have a clean, tidy, decorated and updated Norway Room to enjoy.

She may be trying to reduce how many hours she volunteers in any given day, but she has energy and is a font of knowledge - and knows where a lot of our 'things' are - ready to talk to anyone who wants to be active in our volunteer/friend community. Moving ahead one day at a time, Aaslaug demonstrates how volunteerism adds up, makes a difference and makes us all happy.
